





We will be learning the above sounds over the next few weeks. Can you practise recognizing the sounds? Can you match them to the pictures using the first sounds? S is for snake etc.


Go on a hunt around your house? What other items can you find that begin with these sounds?

Can you practise the squiggle patterns and then copy them onto paper independently? Can you practise writing the patterns




